Dear valued stakeholders and friends,

Wajibu Wetu Children's Trust is a registered organization founded in the year 2005 at Rironi village along the Nairobi-Nakuru Highway. Our name, "Wajibu Wetu," means "our collective responsibility" in Swahili — and that spirit of shared effort has guided us through the 20 years Wajibu Wetu has been in existence. We are grateful for this milestone.

We started with just three vulnerable, fully orphaned children at serious risk of abuse and neglect. Within our first year, that number grew to twelve — and today, those original children are thriving in our home-exit program.

They've all completed secondary and tertiary education, and many are now employed or running their own businesses across the country. We're incredibly proud that they've formed an active Alumni group, giving back through donations, mentorship, and organizing fun co-curricular activities for their younger brothers and sisters still in our care.

Today our home is located in Athi river at Kinanie location-near Komarock slum and bordering Makongeni settlement. These communities along with the surrounding low-income areas are at the heart of our outreach program work which we are seeking to expand in line with the regulations of the children's act 2022.

We focus on children from poor farming families and slum households, providing essential support like food, education, clothing, and sometimes urgent healthcare to help break the cycle of vulnerability.

Our mission remains simple yet powerful: to nurture, educate, and uplift the lives of children and families in slums and vulnerable communities through collective compassion and action. None of this would be possible without the extra ordinary intervention and kindness of so many people. We are deeply grateful from our hearts and we would like to say a big, sincere thank you to:

VISION

A thriving Kenyan community where every vulnerable child is safe, loved, educated, and empowered to break free from poverty and neglect — nurtured together through our shared responsibility.

MISSION

To rescue orphaned and at-risk children from neglect and abuse, provide loving care, quality education, healthcare, and life skills in a family-like home, and guide them toward independence through outreach, exit programs, alumni mentorship, and strong partnerships with government, NGOs, foundations, and communities — all to realize brighter futures for every child we serve.

WAJIBU WETU RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM

The Wajibu Wetu Residential Program provides holistic care for vulnerable children within the Trust's premises. The program has a capacity to accommodate 30 to 35 children at any given time, supported by dedicated caregivers. Its primary goal is to prepare the children for successful reintegration into the community once they reach maturity or when suitable guardians or family members are identified.

In line with the Children Act 2022, which emphasizes the reintegration of children with their biological families, as well as placement in adoption or foster care, Wajibu Wetu is currently

developing a comprehensive transitional program. This initiative will strengthen the organization's vision while ensuring full compliance with government policies and directives.

WAJIBU WETU OUTREACH PROGRAM

The Wajibu Wetu Outreach Program supports vulnerable and less privileged children who live with a parent or guardian in the community. Through this program, we actively contribute to their social welfare by addressing their key needs in education, clothing, food, and healthcare.

In 2026, we plan to expand the Outreach Program significantly. This includes reintegrating suitable residential children who have living relatives back into their families, while continuing to provide them with ongoing support in education, clothing, food, and health. We also aim to enrol more vulnerable children from the community and offer comprehensive assistance with their educational and basic needs.

This expansion represents our pilot phase as we align with the requirements of the Children Act 2022.

WAJIBU WETU EXIT PROGRAM

Our Exit Program works hand-in-hand with the Outreach Program to ensure no child is left behind after leaving our residential care. It offers ongoing support to children who have been successfully reintegrated with their families but still face vulnerability. The program also stands by young adults who have turned 18 and are now in college or university, or those just starting out in life, helping them build the skills and confidence to become independent and responsible members of society.

WAJIBU WETU ALUMNAE PROGRAM

Wajibu Wetu maintains an active Alumnae Group comprising former residential children who were raised at the institution, successfully completed their education, and are now gainfully employed in various sectors of society.

The group was formed with the aim of giving back to the younger children through mentorship, charity activities, and occasional financial support.



In 2025, the alumnae achieved several notable milestones, including providing funding for the installation of two rainwater harvesting tanks, the purchase and installation of a water pump to aid in the filtration of rain water to clean drinking water. The project was initiated in 2024 and completed in 2025 and has been providing clean drinking water. This has led to a decrease in water borne diseases and has also lowered the cost of fuel that was previously used to boil drinking water.

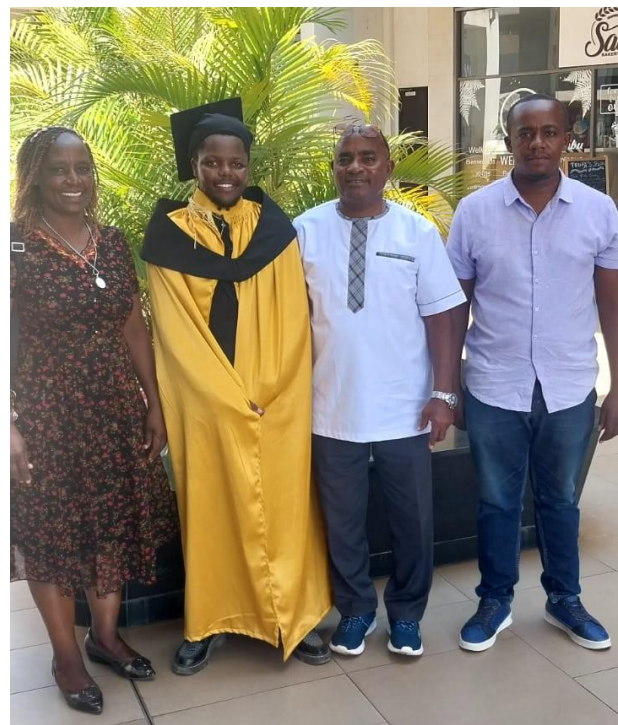

HOUSEHOLD ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT

Our long-term goal as Wajibu Wetu is to achieve greater self-sustainability through diversified income-generating activities. In 2025 we expanded our horizon towards this goal and we engaged in various activities to ensure food security for the children and Income generation.

We implemented the following household strengthening activities:

1. Farming

- a) **Outdoor Farming** – Farming is one of the main activities carried out in Wajibu Wetu with the first goal being for food production to ensure that all the children are sufficiently sustained and nourished.

We contracted the services of an agronomist in 2025 who has helped to largely transform our farming model and to re-align our goals.

Among the major changes we adopted was planting a variety of short term, high demand crops that ensured the farm generated income every week.

We implemented these changes towards the end of 2025 and we have already started receiving positive results with great hope for improved performance in 2026.

b) **Fruit Farming** – We planted various fruit trees in 2024 and they have started producing their first fruits. We have a good coverage of orange trees in the farm as well as avocados, mangoes and Paw Paw trees.

The orange trees have done exceptionally well and we are hopeful of a bumper harvest in 2026. This will be an additional income stream for Wajibu Wetu.

2. Livestock Farming

We are involved in livestock farming to supplement protein needs for the children with an aim of turning it into an income generating venture in the future. We currently rear goats that have grown from 4 to 12 in number. We also have poultry and rabbits that the children help to rear which also teaches them how to be responsible and it also helps them in their growth & development.

Through the Wajibu Wetu Alumnae group we have plans in place to re-launch our dairy project we have a donor who has offered to purchase 1-2 cows to begin with

and the alumnae group have also united to build a bigger and better structure for the dairy cows.

3. Water Utilization & Supply

We utilize most of our water supply for domestic use and irrigation at the farm. In 2025 we focused mainly on irrigation and only sold water minimally to the community. While we have not stopped vending water to those in need in the community, we have chosen to redirect this precious resource into a more profitable area with the hope of improving the output at the farm.

4. Rental Income

We have been fortunate in 2025 to get stable rental income in the hostels built by the kwangu kwako organization through the Imani Foundation. The income obtained from the hostels goes a long way to supplement our budget for the running costs.

ACHIEVEMENTS/COMPLETED PROJECTS IN 2025

- Green house construction & Farming** – In 2025 we made a proposal to the Imani foundation for funding to construct a greenhouse and to cater for the seedlings and farm inputs needed for the first harvest. Through the Imani foundation we received funding for the project and we constructed an 8metres wide by 30metres long green house. The main goal of the green house is to grow high value crops that will generate a higher income than those in the outside farm.

The project construction started in July 2025 and was completed in August 2025.

We planted the first crops (Tomatoes & Red Capsicum) in September and we started to harvest the first fruits late December 2025.

We contracted the services of an Agronomist to guide us through the process and to help improve our general farming practices to ensure that we generate income from the project.

It is our dream and goal that through the right farming practices and market evaluation we will generate a profit from the green house with the potential to add on more units for increased production and income.



- 2. Farm Improvement** – In October 2025 we embarked on an ambitious project to improve the farm by redefining our farming methods to achieve maximum output from the farm. This involved a significant investment financially. We are grateful to the Imani Foundation who agreed to support us in this noble cause. The main aim of this venture is to redesign the farm to operate as a successful business venture that will provide constant income for the organization. The farm Improvement involved changing the whole structure of the farm and the operational model. This is an ongoing process, below are the improvements that we have managed to implement so far;

- a) **Purchase of farm Inputs** - We have purchased additional farm tools, including jembes, slashers, rakes, and others. We have also acquired adequate agro-chemicals and other related farm inputs to boost production on the farm.

- b) **Purchase of Fertilizers and manure** - We have purchased adequate quantities of manure and high-quality fertilizers, to improve soil fertility and boost production.
- c) **Expansion of Drip Irrigation Infrastructure** – We have successfully expanded the drip irrigation infrastructure by installing additional drip lines across the farm. This has significantly increased the area under drip irrigation, maximized the use of our arable land, and improved water efficiency. It's an ongoing process and only a small section remains that will soon also be under drip irrigation.

- d) **Purchase of seedlings and seeds** - We have purchased quality seedlings for high-value crops and short-term harvesting varieties that mature within a short period of time. We have strategically focused on short-maturing crops

with ready market demand to ensure a steady flow of income that supports the operational needs of the farm while generating profits.



We are also working on increasing the commercial fruit tree cover by planting more avocados, oranges, mangoes, and other fruit trees across the farm.

- e) **Employment of additional Farm Labour** - We have employed additional labourers on a casual basis on the farm. This has provided the necessary workforce to implement all the planned activities, including land preparation, planting and general farm operations, ensuring smooth running of the operations on the farm.
- f) **Employment of an Agronomist** - We have contracted the services of a professional Agronomist to support the farm manager. The Agronomist has been providing advice and practical recommendations on the selection of suitable crops and the appropriate farm inputs to be used. He has also helped us to design and implement a crop rotation system that allows crops to be harvested at the right time when market prices are favourable, thereby maximizing profitability.
- g) **Proper planning of the farm** - We have segmented the farm and developed a cropping plan. The entire farm has been clearly divided into well-defined blocks. This has enhanced efficient management, monitoring, and care of the crops planted.

- h) **Green house management** – The resources provided for the farm improvement have helped us in the management of the green house, including the timely supply and application of all necessary inputs such as quality seeds, fertilizers, pesticides, and irrigation resources. This approach has ensured optimal growing conditions, ensuring high-quality yields from the greenhouse.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR GROWTH IN 2026

1. **Green House farming** – with the successful launch of the 1st greenhouse structure and planting and harvesting of the first crop, we have seen positive results. We have learnt through the process and we are even better equipped to do better and to achieve greater results. We project that investing in an additional greenhouse structure will increase production of high value crops which will in turn generate more income.
2. **Solar Lighting system** - The installation of a solar power system will allow us to transition from electricity to solar lighting across the organization. This will include solar panels, inverters, batteries, and solar-powered lights. By switching to solar energy, we will significantly cut down on monthly electricity bills and reduce overall energy costs.
3. **Dairy Farming** – Through the Wajibu Wetu Alumnae group Wajibu Wetu is partnering with them to launch a dairy farming project. This project will include the construction of the modern cow shed and the purchase of 2 cows to start off the project. We are grateful for their commitment and unwavering support towards the welfare of their younger brothers and sisters.
4. **Pig Farming** - In 2026, Wajibu Wetu plans to venture into commercial pig farming as a new area of production. Pig farming, when implemented correctly, offers strong profitability potential due to the short maturity period of pigs and the ready market demand for pork and other pig products.
5. **Mushroom Farming** – Another area we are looking into is mushroom farming. Mushroom farming requires minimal space as the mushrooms are grown in a house structure/shed. The mushrooms do not require a lot of inputs/land to grow and if done correctly they might provide an additional source of income and nutrition.
6. **Rain water harvesting/Damming** – We are currently developing an idea we have of harvesting rain water that we can substitute with borehole water for irrigation purposes. We receive a lot of rainfall during the rainy seasons in our area but unfortunately most of it is washed down into streams and rivers which ultimately flow all the way to the ocean without providing much needed sustenance during the dry period. We currently have 5 water tanks that we use to harvest rain

water that is mostly used for drinking and cooking purposes which takes us through the dry seasons. The borehole water is very salty and cannot be used for consumption.

There is a seasonal river at the bottom area of our farm that holds large quantities of water. In an ambitious long-term dream, we believe that if we are to dam the water by building a small wall to slow down the flow of water, it would create a water catchment area. This would enable us and the surrounding community to have water to utilize during the dry season for farming. We are located in an arid and semi-arid area of the country that experiences harsh droughts very often, the damming of the water would change lives by enabling Wajibu Wetu and the surrounding community have access to water for farming even during the dry season. This would improve food stability for many families, generate income and help to alleviate general poverty in the community.

CHALLENGES/OPPORTUNITIES IN 2025/2026

- 1. Rising cost of living/economy** – In recent years, Kenya has faced a notable increase in the cost of living, primarily attributed to the prevailing economic conditions in the country. Consequently, there has been a marked rise in the prices of basic commodities, particularly food, alongside increased costs for essential services such as healthcare, education, and fuel.
- 2. Motor vehicle** – We are currently facing a challenge in regards our motor vehicle. It has served us well for the past 14 years providing transportation and essential support in the daily operations of the organization. It has greatly worn out over time due to old age and the rough terrain of the area we live in. Over the past 3 years it has been costing us more in terms of maintenance and repairs as it keeps breaking down frequently. It is our appeal to our donors and well wishers to support in the purchase of a motor vehicle which is essential in our day-to-day operations.

3. **Health Insurance** - Providing adequate healthcare remains one of our biggest challenges. Every time a child falls sick, we are forced to pay for consultations, medicines, and treatment entirely out of pocket. We believe that enrolling the children in the national health insurance scheme under the Social Health Authority (SHA) would make a huge difference. It would help cover their medical needs whenever they fall ill, allowing us to focus more resources on their overall care and development.
